Chief Operations Officer's Greeting

There are times when I feel like a small cog in a machine that doesn't fully recognize a foster parents value. Yet, without that cog, the machine can't function.

The system where we operate is struggling financially, and investing in maintaining even the smallest cogs is often overlooked. For decades, we have been treated as an easily renewable resource. However, times have changed. We are no longer easily replaceable, but maintenance funding is still not prioritized.

At FPSO, we are often asked by those in the system why foster parents aren't willing to take in children with higher needs, why many are leaving foster care, and why it is difficult to retain new foster parents. Our response is consistent: there is a lack of support, including respite, fair reimbursement, good training, and respect. In other words, the system does not invest in maintaining this valuable resource—foster parents. Like any machine, failing to provide maintenance results in higher costs when parts break down, and it's a struggle to replace them.

FPSO works to maintain foster care availability for children in need by providing high-quality training and support, despite a shrinking budget. Ontario is the only province or territory that does not provide financial support to its foster care provincial organization, leaving us dependent on membership dues that have not increased in years. While FPSO members receive free monthly training, we must charge for in-person and virtual conferences. We strive to keep these costs low to ensure access to high-quality training.

Please invest in foster carers by supporting their attendance at our conference. This will help them remain effective and resilient during this challenging time in child welfare.

Corporate Update

As I think about what to write in this corporate report, I think back over the past year, and am surprised myself at some of the things that have changed and those that have stayed the same.

We continue to run the Board with great attention to the balance of incoming monies and expenditures, and even with the limited income, last year the board was able to put away one more \$10,000.00 short term open GIC. We do this as often as we can to improve the interest income earned from any unused funds we have, as we are continually mindful of how attrition continues to reduce our annual income. We are putting away today to help protect tomorrow.

As the money seems to be decreasing, the work seems to be growing. The numbers of community partners or groups who are reaching out to FPSO has increased, seems people have realized we are here, and we are relevant. We help information share where we can for the best interest of the children we all mutually care for. Some of these connections become trainers for us, in other cases we become trainers for them. Sometimes we move forward together supporting each other's goals and objectives.

Last year we did greater work in the area of our Advocacy Program. In 2025 we trained almost twice as many new advocates as we did in 2024, so far this year the trend seems to be continuing. We are also finding an increase in agency staff interested in taking the Advocacy Module One – Advocacy Foundations.

Considering the increased interest in Advocacy One we will be looking to increase the availability of the other Advocacy Modules over the course of the year.

Another area that took a great deal of work in 2025 was the revamping of the FPSO website. If you have taken a look lately you will see a far improved website. It continues to be a work in progress – so bear with us as we grow forward with the new technology.

Speaking of revamping we cannot forget about the work we have been doing on the reimagining of the local FPA/FFA. Last year we had 5 or 6 areas in the “reboot” “revamp” start over mode, we are helping as we can and as we are asked.

One of the supports for this reimagining work is what we are now calling our “All Leaders” meetings with a goal to set these up every other month. These meetings are open to all Presidents, Directors, RLO, executive members or anyone else who works in support of foster families. The goal of these meetings is to share information and network together. We all not only need each other, but we can learn from one another.

I am hoping we will see many of our “All Leaders group at conference and increase the relationships we hope to build.

Training Coordinators Report

I'm writing this COO report at 4:30 a.m.—the calmest moment I can find in a busy home with four high-needs neurodivergent kids even though one of them is already up keeping me company. As a morning person, I appreciate this quiet time when my mind feels clearest. By the time their 7 p.m. bedtime arrives, I'm usually worn out and running on autopilot, sometimes wondering if we've made a real difference that day.

Foster parents across the province faced the challenges of COVID-19 with incredible dedication, continuing to care for children through such a difficult time. Even now, in the years since the pandemic, the commitment to providing essential care remains strong—even as we all do our best with limited resources and support for both kids and caregivers.

As caregivers, we all face setbacks. Sometimes, despite our best efforts, we aren't able to meet a child's needs and must help them move to a placement that's a better fit. These moments are tough. But even the smallest steps forward—any progress that helps a child grow—remind us why we do this. We keep going, and we're lifted every day by the encouragement and understanding of our peers.

People who haven't experienced foster care firsthand may not always understand the challenges we face. There's the sadness of saying goodbye to children we've come to love, but also the joy of seeing a child reunited with their family. It can be frustrating when the support a child needs isn't available, and the system doesn't always recognize the vital role foster families play. Yet, every day, we overcome these hurdles together. Our community supports one another—sharing struggles, frustrations, successes, and losses, and reminding each other that we're not alone.

FFA and FPA members across the province are facing tough times. Foster parents deal with daily challenges and sometimes wonder if they can keep going, but the children in our care count on us. Now, more than ever, we need each other's support. Even the smallest gesture—like a quick call to a new foster parent—can make all the difference, helping someone feel less alone and more encouraged to continue. We love seeing people get involved with FPSO and local FFA/FPA chapters. Whether you can volunteer, mentor, or just lend a listening ear, every effort matters.

Package One (A), (B), (C)	Day packages, these can be either Friday, Saturday or Sunday, multiple day packages can also be selected when no overnight accommodations are required. Day packages include mid-workshop snack breaks and lunches. Dinner may also be purchased.
Package Two	Friday and Saturday Only (Two-day package) includes overnight stay on Friday night, Friday lunch and dinner, Saturday Breakfast and lunch, plus all snack breaks for both days.
Package Three	Saturday and Sunday Only (Two-day package) includes overnight stay on Saturday night, Saturday lunch and dinner, Sunday Breakfast, lunch and grab and go dinner, plus all snack breaks for both days.

General Conference Details

Hospitality Suite will be in the residence, in meeting room 1 & 2 (to the left of the residence check in) It will run both Friday and Saturday evening from 7:00-10:00. This is a great place to connect, network, visit, snacks and soft drinks will be provided.

Saying Good Bye With Elizabeth Lovrics

Who	<p>Presenter Biography After a brief career in the fine arts field and then taking some time off to raise three children, Elizabeth embarked on a career in children’s mental health. For 20 years, Elizabeth worked at the Sickkids CCMH, formerly known as the Hendricks Dellcrest, Centre, in the residential treatment programs. She initially worked with adolescents with complex mental health needs as a frontline worker and then as a Child and family therapist. She has certificates and specialized training in a variety of therapy models including DBT, CBT, Narrative therapy, and Trauma and Crisis Intervention. She has co-created and facilitated skills groups for adolescents in the residential programs and for their parents. Currently, Elizabeth is in private practice in Toronto. She has facilitated workshops for community members and professionals in a variety of settings across the GTA, the northern community, other provinces and the U.S.</p> 
What	<p>Workshop Description</p> <p>As we embark in fostering with children, we do not always anticipate the many facets of this journey through a difficult part of their complicated lives. It is often only once we are directly facing that challenge, such as supporting the departure of a child while tending to the child(ren) left in the home, that we are confronted by the complexities of the passage in life.</p> <p>This workshop will discuss how to manage endings and further separations in a child’s life and process separations when a foster child leaves the home and a sibling stays behind. Similarly, we will develop strategies for how to manage the departure of a foster child who has been in the home for a while and connected with the other members of the foster family, including both biological and other foster children. Finally, we will learn skills to help the other children at home make sense of the change.</p> <p>The workshop will explore the emotions of grief, anger, sadness, and fear that may be associated with transitions, and heightened by children who already experienced losses, and the psychological impacts of this time, including attachment disruptions, abandonment fears, and possible behavioural changes. We can dedicate time to explore individual situations that people may be encountering, through an attachment lens and across developmental stages.</p> <p>The workshop will provide a variety of practical skills and techniques to support the transition, process the loss for the children and the foster parent, and mitigate the impact of the change.</p>

Who Presenter Biography

Takiyah Wedderburn is the Founder of Natural Kids Movement (NKM), a non-profit organization established in 2015 to address the overrepresentation of Black children in Ontario's child welfare system. With nearly 20 years of experience as a Child & Youth Care practitioner, Takiyah has dedicated her career to supporting and advocating for the well-being of vulnerable children, youth, and families in education, child welfare, and treatment care settings. Under her leadership, NKM has grown into a platform that empowers communities, uplifts marginalized voices, and advocates for systemic change.



What Interactive Black Hair Care Workshop


A hands-on workshop that teaches proper care techniques for curly/Afro-textured hair, empowering youth with self-care skills and educating caregivers on culturally responsive hair care practices. This workshop will utilize Afro textured mannequins with human hair as an educational tool.

Black Skin Care Workshop


This workshop provides foster parents with practical knowledge and hands-on guidance on caring for the unique skin care needs of Black children. Many caregivers supporting Black children in foster care may not have previously received training on culturally specific hair and skin care practices. This session is designed to bridge that gap by offering clear, accessible guidance that caregivers can confidently apply in their daily routines.

Participants will learn about the structure and characteristics of Black skin, common skin conditions affecting Black children, proper moisturizing techniques, product selection, and common mistakes to avoid. The workshop also explores the connection between skin care, self-image, and emotional wellbeing, helping caregivers understand how culturally informed care can support a child's confidence, dignity, and sense of belonging.

Who	<p>Mary-Jo Land</p> <p>Mary Jo is a Registered Psychotherapist in private practice (virtual) in Ontario. As a former foster / adoptive parent, Mary-Jo has lived experience of AFCCA. She was a founding member of the National Consortium on AFCCA and is a Non-Violent Resistance Therapist and Practitioner. As a developmentalist, Mary-Jo specializes in AFCCA, attachment, adoption, foster care and developmental trauma. She is the author of <i>Caring Together: A guide for foster parents, adoptive parents and parents of children in care</i> and is co-editor, co-author of <i>Healing Connections: A community Approach to Childhood Trauma and Attachment</i> (available through attach.org)</p> 
What	<p>Aggression towards Family / Caregivers during Childhood and Adolescence (AFCCA): when children harm in the home.</p> <p>Walking on eggshells. Dreading outbursts. Feeling isolated. Wondering how this can continue. Nothing seems to work, even though you are trying your best.</p> <p>Some children express aggression towards caregivers and other children or pets in their home. It is the most common reason children change foster placement. In this workshop, we will explore the phenomenon of AFCCA, the experiences of caregivers. and the pathways to safety, non-escalation, boundaries, support and repair, including Non-Violent Resistance practices. This workshop will be both didactic learning and discussion.</p>
